The Importance of Mobile Equipment Physicals



The Upstate has a heavy concentration of manufacturing-related work. With manufacturing, you have parts, raw materials and finished products moving from one place to another from outside your organization and inside your production area. Powered industrial vehicles

Operators of powered industrial vehicles need special on-the-job training as an integral part of their job. Powered industrial vehicle operators must be alert, well-trained, healthy and physically fit to complete their duties well. The Occupational Health and Safety Administration (OSHA) General Duty Clause states, "Each employer shall furnish to each of his employees' employment and a place of employment which are free from recognized hazards that are causing or are likely to cause death or serious physical harm to his employees." So, what does this mean? Essentially, the burden lies on the employer to ensure that industrial-powered equipment operators are healthy and safe.

Consider standing on your production floor in the environment where your powered industrial vehicle operator is working. Consider the noise, visual distractions, other powered industrial vehicles, other associates walking about, moving machine parts, raw materials and products, potential debris or clutter, tight, cramped spaces and the need to be on the go to meet production goals. Now add operator John Doe, an excellent employee but also a disabled individual who, over the years, may have developed additional skills to bypass some fitness tests. He has been absent from work for longer than one month. He brings a doctor's note verifying his absence and wants to return to work as usual. But a doctor's letter does not constitute a medical assessment for suitability to continue operating a powered industrial vehicle. It is merely a medical excuse note. You must ask yourself: did John Doe have a medical condition that could impact his ability to operate the powered industrial vehicle safely? Is he on any concerning medications? Does he have restrictions or limitations? How would John Doe respond to an emergency, working at night, moving highly toxic or explosive materials, or working in a particularly demanding environment now?

At Spartanburg Regional Corporate Health, we have trained medical providers and board-certified occupational medicine physicians who not only understand and treat medical problems but are your subject matter experts for occupational-related medical issues that involve the health, safety and well-being of your employees. We offer mobile equipment medical physicals for powered industrial vehicle operators. These physicals include a thorough physical examination of your associate, a review of their medical and surgical history, current medications and potential side effects, hearing and vision evaluation, urinalysis and blood pressure. We have mirrored our medical assessment and decision-making process to follow DOT medical standards and guidelines for a more streamlined, consistent and transparent process. In addition to medical evaluations, we also offer DOT and non-DOT drug screening because industrial-powered vehicle operators are in a safety-critical position and must be free of alcohol or substance abuse issues.

As an employer, you should view mobile equipment physicals as a safety measure for the operator and others in the vicinity of the vehicle in operation. So let us help you keep your powered industrial operators safe and healthy.
